About The Museum

The Dearborn Historical Museum was founded in 1950 to preserve the history of Dearborn and its citizens.

It is our mission to provide enriching educational opportunities and meaningful visitor experiences while instilling a sense of appreciation for the City of Dearborn's past, present, and future.

The museum has three locations:

The Commandant's Quarters

Built in 1833, This building was one of eleven that was part of the Detroit Arsenal, and is Dearborn's oldest building in its original location.





The McFadden-Ross House

Built in 1839, this building was originally the powder magazine of the Detroit Arsenal. It was later purchased by Nathaniel Ross and converted into a family home.

The Gardner House

This is one of the oldest Dearborn homes still standing today, and was built in 1831 by Richard Gardner while Michigan was still a territory.



The Pioneer Program

This year's virtual Pioneer Program will include all of the historical fun that you have come to expect from our field trip in previous years. It will combine eight short video segments replicating the usual Pioneer School Program experience, with activities, projects, history, and games that can be shared with students both in the classroom, and at home, to show what life was like during 1800's Wayne County.

Each video segment will cover a different topic, including what it means to be a historian and how the city has changed over time, and will connect with Social Studies Unit 5: How Do Communities Change.

As many educators can attest, field trips have long-term positive impacts on students. By creating a virtual field trip for students to utilize, we are making sure that this year's second graders are not missing out on the wonderful experiences they would have had while visiting the Museum in person.
